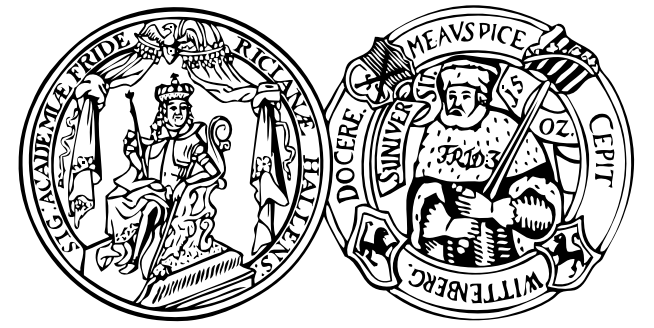


Third Conference on Bengal Related Studies for Students and Young Scholars
